The Bishop Dwenger Varsity Cheer Team added another State title to their growing list of accomplishments. In November, the team competed against eight other finalists in the Varsity B Division. Despite injuries, Covid, and other impediments, the team rallied together. They were able to cheer their way into the top spot and won the State title. The BDHS Cheer program has the most State titles out of any program in the school's history. They have 10 Varsity titles, five JV titles, and 10 Freshman titles. On top of State wins, they also have 13 National Championship titles under their belt. The program was started by Vicki Kuker, who helped lead the squad to victory this year. That makes this her 49th year of coaching our Dwenger Saints. The Cheer team is thrilled with the first-place finish and is ready to make it to Nationals this spring. Arts & Letters -Seth Boyden '11

Trying his hand as an artist in 6th grade, Seth began with claymation, buying cheap blocks of clay and animating them by taking incremental pictures with an old family camera to create the illusion of movement. By the time he began high school, he knew he wanted to pursue a career in animation, where he could draw and create stories for people to see.

Citing his high school art teacher Marcy Adams' class as the most influential in shaping his future, Seth says Mrs. Adams always pushed him out of his artistic comfort zone to sharpen his technique and challenge his conventional approach to art-making.

After high school, Seth earned his Bachelor of Fine Arts degree at California Institute of the Arts. While a student, he created 'An Object at Rest,' an animated short film that won the silver medal at the 2015 Student Academy Awards, was awarded the Walter and Gracie Lantz Animation Prize at the 2015 CalArts Character Animation Producers' Show, and was listed in the Top 10 for the 2015 Academy Awards Best Animated Short Film. He also received the Special Jury Award at the British Academy of Film and Television Arts in Los Angeles.

Today, Seth works as a story artist at Walt Disney Animation Studios. He is known for his work in several movies, including Ferdinand, Spies in Disguise, and Encanto.

Alumna of the Year -Lara Nguyen '94

With a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree from Columbus College of Art and Design, and a Masters in Fine Arts from Southern Illinois University at Carbondale, Lara is the Chair of the Art Department at Warren Wilson College in North Carolina, where she received the Excellence in Teaching Award. She owns Stone Cloud Studio with her husband, Todd Frahm, who is a sculptor. They have two children.

She volunteers as a judge for local art competitions and exhibitions, and as a translator for Asheville City Schools. As a muralist for community art exhibits, she was awarded the Davidson Experience Grant through Warren Wilson College in Community Partnership with Emma Elementary in Asheville, NC. In addition, she was awarded a Work College Consortium Grant that allows her to work with the Burton Street Neighborhood Association and the Vine Street Community Garden to design and create murals with Warren Wilson College students and community members in collaboration.

Twelve years of Catholic education taught Lara acceptance, forgiveness, unconditional love, and to help serve the underserved. The Lara Nguyen Fine Arts Scholarship has been awarded annually since 1997 to selected upcoming 8th graders at Saint Jude Catholic School.

Citizens of Two Worlds -Megan (Oberhausen '04) Swaim

Megan has served every parish and school of which she has been a member since her youth. This includes Our Lady of Good Hope, Saint Charles, and Bishop Dwenger. She recalls as her fondest memory of BD that of meeting her now husband, Josh, when they both attended the March for Life. They now have four daughters.

Megan attended Marian University, where she earned a Bachelor of Art in Philosophy. She has worked as Associate Director for the Office of Youth Ministry and Spiritual Formation for the Diocese of Fort Wayne-South Bend, and Director of High School Youth Ministry at Saint Pius X Catholic Church. In these roles, she wrote a manual for Youth Ministry, directives for liturgies involving youth, organized a diocesan World Youth Day pilgrimage to Madrid, and organized 400 days of content during the Year of Faith.

She currently serves the Catholic Church through Catholic Sprouts, a ministry committed to helping parents evangelize to their children. She has played an instrumental role in all of the content produced by Catholic Sprouts and, most notably, has played a key part in the creation of the Domestic Church Project Bootcamp, a 6-week training program for Catholic Families that enables them to build and lead their Domestic Church.



Alumnus of the Year -Andy Dailey '93

After graduating from Bishop Dwenger, Andy earned degree in Culinary Arts at Johnson & Wales University in Providence, RI. There, he focused on the progressive development and practice of culinary skills and techniques, product identification and cooking methods, then expanded to the study of classical and contemporary techniques and flavor profiles used in the production of the major world cuisines.

After graduating from Culinary School, Andy returned to Fort Wayne and began his own IT business while working as a chef at a downtown restaurant. Today, Andy and his wife Holly have one daughter, who attends BD. Andy is the Director of Food Service at Saint Vincent de Paul Catholic School, where he also serves as Systems Administrator. He believes in using his vocation to bring people closer to the faith, and he wants to teach children to encounter Christ through their food experience. He plans the students' meals around the liturgical calendar, serving food appropriate to whatever the feast day may be. He treats his cafeteria as his classroom, teaching students the importance of being kind to the person eating lunch next to them.

Four times a year, Andy cooks the meals for the men and women attending the Christ Renews His Parish weekend retreats, putting much thought and prayer into each weekend.

Athletics -1990 & 1991 State Championship **Football Teams**


Led by five-time SAC Coach of the Year, Andy Johns, the 1990 and 1991 Bishop Dwenger High School Football Teams brought home back-to-back football State Championships for the City of Fort Wayne.

Prior to the 1990 season, the players on that team resolved to not lose a single game. Their hard work in the off-season paid off, as the team went undefeated, setting or breaking several team and individual records along the way. The Saints were unstoppable at the Hoosier Dome against New Palestine, winning the game with a score of 56-14. Today, these players still recall the closeness of the team that made them play unselfishly as one unit.

The following year, the 1991 team was defeated only once in the regular season. They regrouped and won the rest of their games, facing many tough opponents. The Saints were back at the Hoosier Dome, this time facing Indianapolis Cathedral. With the game tied 27-27, a key play by the Saints allowed them to win the game with a score of 34-27.

As we celebrate the 30th and 31st anniversaries of Bishop Dwenger's football state championships, we applaud these fine student-athletes, coaches, managers, and all of the die-hard fans who made the fall of 1990 and 1991 seasons to remember!







While the School Choice program has undoubtedly helped families of varying means, there are still many who benefit from our tuition assistance initiatives.


GOING THE EXTRA MILE

An Academic Life

As a recent college graduate who is just starting a career in engineering, I have become more and more aware over the past few years of how BD's academics prepared me for the challenges that would lie ahead. At Dwenger, I had the opportunity to take many AP and dual-credit classes, like calculus, chemistry, APUSH, and W131. These got me accustomed to the more challenging course load that I would face in college and allowed me to enter Purdue's first-year engineering program already having credits for a handful of classes. Being able to skip some of these first year or gen-ed classes went a long way, especially at a large public university. This meant I had more flexibility with my schedule and could lighten the load for later semesters when I would be enrolled in the more advanced classes specific to my major. I felt well-prepared for the increasingly heavy workloads as I continued through Purdue's civil engineering curriculum because of the solid academic foundation laid for me at BD. I continually drew on the work ethic and study habits I had developed during some of the more difficult semesters filled with AP and dual credit classes during my junior and senior years of high school.



Now in the beginning of my career as a structural engineer, I still rely on the habits I developed at Dwenger, and make daily use of knowledge from classes fundamental to engineering like calculus and physics. I have also come to appreciate the importance and necessity of a different set of classes I took at BD. An often taken for granted skillset, being able to effectively communicate ideas through speaking and writing, is critical to success in any professional setting, and potential employers are quick to recognize who has or has not mastered these skills. I have found that having the ability to communicate clearly is just as important as having the proper technical knowledge in most cases. I feel capable of handling all types of tasks put in front of me in the professional world because of classes I took at BD like speech and W131. These are just a few examples of how the many different facets of Dwenger's academic program have set me up to be successful both in college and afterwards, and for that I will always be grateful.

A Life of Service Craig Vanderwall '99

How great that our life is a gift from God! How great that we can give that gift to all of those around us! The "you" in your life is the "you" who has the power to change the world. As a student at BD, I never fully understood what life is. It took life "happening" for me to understand that it is the gift of being called to service. While taking Discovery and Service my senior year, I learned a pivotal lesson that "I" was not the center of the universe. I learned that my life here on earth is a gift to be shared with the world.

Then it all came crashing down shortly after graduation. While my friends went on to college, I had to withdraw my first semester due to major health complications. That fall, I had four emergency surgeries and two brushes with death. By 2008, that increased to eighteen surgeries and five brushes with death. While walking across the campus at the University of Saint Francis, I was having a conversation with a professor. I was in a pretty dark spot, but she said, "Craig, you don't get it - You have a greater calling. You are here for a reason." From that early fall afternoon came an epiphany to lead a life of service. I then dedicated myself to the University and my community. Volunteering and philanthropy became my second vocation.

As a college student, I served on the Student Council and as President of the student body. I have remained dedicated to my alma mater, serving as a director since 2005 and a founding member and co-chair of the Busse-Fabini Cougar Classic. I have also had the pleasure to serve the National Kidney Foundation of Indiana, the National Soccer Festival, and am founding member of the Believe in a Dream Foundation and Three Rivers Music Theater. I have also become involved with the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society as a Man of the Year candidate, winner, chair, and All-Star and Team Member. Robert F. Rossiter, Jr. '74 was nominated to the District of Nebraska Court bench in 2015, and the U.S. Senate confirmed his appointment in 2016. He has recently been appointed Chief Judge of the District Court. Prior to becoming a judge, he practiced law for 30 years as a member of Fraser Stryker law firm, and was an adjunct professor at Creighton


