I am blessed to work in a place where I am inspired daily by the perseverance and fortitude of our students, staff, and other Saints. In my personal life, I find inspiration in my family. My children, parents and, especially, my husband inspire me in so many ways. Of everyone in my life that I am so fortunate to know and who influence me, my grandmother stands out. The quote above was her advice to me when, at my baby shower, each mother was asked to share words of wisdom. Of all the heartfelt responses, hers is the one I remember most.

At less than five feet tall, she is a tower of strength, perseverance, and faith. Recently celebrating her 98th birthday, she has been through much. She raised her three younger brothers and is a survivor of both The Great Depression and WWII, while still graduating as Salutatorian of the Central Catholic Class of 1942. Her life-long love, Eugene Haifley, left CCHS to spend his own senior year fighting in Japan for the US Navy. They married upon his return and were blessed with seven children whom they raised to become strong Catholics and love the Church. She never forgets a birthday or anniversary and still attends daily Mass. As a little girl, I remember visiting her and being surrounded by faith: a large painting of Christ, pictures of the Pope, and her chair next to

grandpa with a Missalette, Rosary beads and, of course, her saltwater taffy.

If we are lucky, we all can think of someone who evokes such inspiration. Inspiration is not only found in clutch moments and grand gestures, but more often in the little things. It's in the birthday cards, the beads, and the taffy. We find it in the love another person pours into their 'daily grind' to make our own lives a little sweeter. Inspiration in its most pure form is when someone can look at another and, despite difficulties, differences, or distance, just love 'em.

# "There is no greater love than this, to lay down one's life." - John 15:13

The path to parenthood for Jessica and Jim Breckler '02 didn't unfold as they planned. "We found out fairly early in our marriage that we had fertility challenges," shares Jessica. "Through prayer and guidance, we realized that adoption was God's 'Plan A' for us." Open to this plan, they welcomed daughter Josie, and sons, James and Luke. Over the years, they began to realize their family was likely complete. With their youngest seven years old and thinking she would be an early empty nester, Jessica was reminded God works in mysterious ways. Ten years after the birth of Josie, her birthmother, Mary\*, was expecting a boy. While trying to create a loving a plan for her child, she wished she could keep them together and share the same loving home. The Breckler Family grew once more in June 2022 with Theo, Josie's full biological sibling. Their family and community expanded, as they maintain relationships with each birthparent.

Reflecting on community, Jim shares, "Catholic communities are great at being pro-life, but there isn't a lot of discussion about those who struggle with infertility, and what 'pro-life' looks like for them." He credits Bishop Dwenger Theology teacher, Mr. Oross, with expanding his heart and, unknowingly, helping him prepare for the fatherhood God had in store. "He taught us to make our faith our own," Jim recalls. "We read the works of great Catholic thinkers, saints, about their hard times and how God's plan was revealed. We learned what it looked like to trust God." As providence would have it, Mr. Oross was also an adoptive father. He showed Jim what community is and how it is different for everyone.

"Our communities have been a blessing," states Jim. "Our children's birthparents had a different community experience. Each birthparent had a vision for their child. They shared that they never had an example of what a stable marriage, family, or community is, yet they somehow all chose life and what was best for the children. Through their devastating experiences, they chose this love." Jessica adds, "We, as pro-life Catholics, need to be willing to expand what community looks like. Do we welcome and love those from other community experiences the way Christ would? Do we to step out of our own comforts? What does being 'pro-life' look like?"

The Brecklers hope people will be inspired, not so much by them, but by the birthparents. "People say 'give up for adoption,' when the last thing they did was 'give up,'" explains Jessica. "They made an intentional plan out of love. They each recognized the unique life they were carrying. Each parent wanted us to share that it was not that they just loved them, but LOVE them and always will. They thought of others the whole time. We have been blessed by them."

It is bittersweet as she remembers these birthparents. "I always think of the verse from John 15, 'there is no greater love than this, to lay down one's life' and that is what birthparents do. Their greatest sorrow is my greatest joy. We pray for them as a family every night by name. I tell the kids their birthparents love them." This love radiates through each child. Jessica knew they truly understood when one night she watched Josie kiss her new baby brother goodnight and whisper, "I love you. Mommy and Daddy love you. And Mary\* loves you."

### Christ the Teacher Award



Congratulations to Mrs. Elizabeth "Liz" (Schuerman '03) Walker, the 2021-22 Christ the Teacher Award recipient! Liz's own experience as a student of both Saint Vincent de Paul School and Bishop Dwenger High School provided significant insight to her vocation as a teacher, as well as how she connects with students. "I was going to be an astronaut or a doctor," she recalls, and notes she took every science course she could fit into her schedule in preparation. Opening her mind to the possibility of becoming an educator, Liz sought the counsel of Dan Loney, one of her teachers at Bishop Dwenger, who encouraged her to seek dual degrees in Biology and Secondary Education. She also earned a minor in Chemistry and went on to earn two masters degrees, one in Biological Science education and the other in Geological Science education.

While all this knowledge is important, Liz believes that connecting with the students significantly affects their comprehension. Meeting their needs as humans first with compassion, empathy, sympathy, and a shoulder to lean on is essential. In addition to the 110-120 students enrolled in her classes, she regularly sees former students and SEA Club members, for whom she is the faculty advisor. They still stop by for a quick word of encouragement, advice, or a moment of decompression. Liz challenges them "to grab onto some part of the class or lesson that inspires them and then dig deeper. Not every lesson or concept is going to do that, so pick the one and learn as much as you can about it. Explore why it intrigues you," she explains. Bishop Dwenger High School is blessed to have Liz as an educator, mentor, and advisor since 2007. Congratulations, Liz!

Our beloved, legendary Carol Cornell passed away peacefully December 18, 2021, at the age of 77. She began teaching Theology at Bishop Dwenger in 1973 and, by the end of her 30-year teaching career, had taught every course offered in the Theology curriculum. She was famous for her knowledge of Church history, especially the history of our Popes.

While enriching their lives through religion, Carol also enriched students' lives through culture. She and other chaperones took hundreds of students to destinations all over the world. Carol retired in 2003 from Bishop Dwenger and went on to enjoy a successful second career as a highly ranked travel agent. Meanwhile, she continued to keep stats for Dwenger football with Dave Scudder, a tradition of theirs for 40 years.

She was heavily involved with fundraising for Saints Alive!, especially serving on the committee for the Holiday Tables Luncheon, hosted at the home of Patsy Dumas, her dear friend and "partner in crime" for over 35 years. She also volunteered for Christ Child Society, Euell Wilson Center, and Saint Vincent de Paul Catholic Church.

Carol will forever be remembered for her quick wit, sense of humor, compassion for her students, and legendary stories. She provided an excellent Catholic education for students, preparing them to become "Citizens of Two Worlds." Well done, good and faithful servant. May you rest in peace.

After Carol's husband, Lyle, passed away in 2000, Carol established the Lyle Cornell Scholarship in his memory at Bishop Dwenger. We would like to continue this scholarship for future Saints, renaming it "The Lyle and Carol Cornell Memorial Scholarship." # EXPANDING EDUCATION OPTIONS IN INDIANA

In 2021, the Indiana General Assembly significantly increased the income threshold used to determine eligibility for the Indiana Choice Scholarship Program. As a result, more Indiana families are able to choose Catholic schools for their children's education. This program significantly reduces a family's tuition bill. Award amounts are based on the school district in which the family lives and pays property taxes.

By recently increasing the program's household income eligibility guidelines, lawmakers expanded the number of Indiana students who are now eligible for the Choice Program. These changes also increased award amounts. Since these changes took effect, more Dwenger families have benefited, as follows:

2020-2021 School Year: 400+ students received the School Choice Scholarship, totaling approximately \$1.9 M 2021-2022 School Year: 500+ students received the School Choice Scholarship, totaling approximately \$3.1 M

### **CREATING A PATHWAY**

Establishing income eligibility is the first step toward receiving the Choice Scholarship. The second is determining a pathway or qualification for the award.

Families that are income-eligible but have always attended Catholic schools are advised to contact their school to begin the process of securing a Scholarship Granting Organization (SGO) Award. This will provide a pathway to receive the Choice Scholarship the following year, if still income-eligible. The most common pathways are attendance at a public school for the last two semesters, a previous SGO for the enrolling child or sibling, or a special education need and documented IEP or SIP.

Ultimately, our goal is to make Catholic Education affordable for everyone! Approximately 65% of our families receive some form of tuition assistance. In addition to SGO Awards and Choice Scholarships, BDHS offers the following to qualifying students and families: Merit-based Scholarships, Need-based Scholarships, and Tuition Assistance.

# DWENGER BY THE NUMBERS

Bishop Dwenger High School offers academic core courses in English, Math, Science, World Languages, Social Studies, and Theology. Various levels are taught, including Honors and Advanced Placement. There are also a variety of elective courses in the departments of Art, Music (vocal and instrumental), Business, and Vocational Programs at the Anthis Career Center.

We are confident that for generations to come, Bishop Dwenger High School will provide the quality of academic excellence that our parents have come to expect by teaching the whole person in the Catholic tradition. We will always look forward to ensure that Dwenger's future remains bright.



A member of Bishop Dwenger's class of 1967 has accused Whitten of engaging in an inappropriate relationship. Out of respect for the privacy of the individual who made this credible allegation, the Poor Handmaids will not say anything further regarding the allegation or the response to it.

The Poor Handmaids are saddened to hear of this abuse. The safety and well-being of all children, including all those served by the ministry of the Poor Handmaids, is of the highest importance to us. Abuse of any kind is appalling. The mission of the Poor Handmaids affirms our desire to respect and value each person we serve and to search for justice. Poor Handmaids are committed to responding to any allegation of abuse pastorally, with compassion and sensitivity to all those who may be affected. The Sisters' prayers go out to the individual who brought this allegation.
